The Fifth Generation Goes on the Road

When we arrived at the subway, we talked about how you figure out which train to take. We learned what it is like to take the subway during rush hour when you are crowded on a train.



I was amazed at how calm he was as we walked through the busy streets. The article talks about how we are not letting our children fail. Years ago, everyone was talking about Helicopter Parents. The new term is "Snowplow Parents." story is "Prepare your child for the path, not the path for your child." As a parent of three boys (ages 8,6, and 4), I'm often looking at ways to develop our children. They are growing up in a different world than I did. What can I do to prepare them for this new world? Our children are referred to as digital natives. They have never known a world without smartphones, tablets, instant access to the answers. I want to teach them to search for the answer, experience life, and gain confidence by forging their own path. I want them to be able to walk to the bus or ride their bike to school on their own. This was very common in my childhood - I remember walking home the three blocks from school in 2nd or 3rd grade. Another one of my best memories from this year was Jackson heading out to the streets in his Boy Scout uniform to sell popcorn. He sold over \$2,000 by walking up and down the streets of our neighborhood by himself. He walked a bit taller and had a bit more confidence every time he returned home. I think it is time to see if he can start selling Cutco knives or vacuum cleaners (haha!).

How can we as parents prepare our children for the path?

1. We can teach them that they can do things on their own. Let the walk to the bus stop, to the nearby

store, or to a friend's house. We must fight the urge to intervene in every argument between siblings or friends. They are learning how to problem solve.

- 2. We must find time for unstructured play. Our children are too scheduled. They need time to just "hang out" without devices. Play with Legos, play house, create a new game, run around the yard, or draw.
- 3. Spend some one-on-one time with each child. The most rewarding aspect of my trip with Jackson was to spend some solo time with him. We had some fun conversations, created shared memories, and deepened our relationship. Someone once said, "if you don't spend time talking to them when they are little, they won't talk to you when they are older."

This parenting thing is tough. For every success as a parent, I think I have three or four failures. I always tell new parents, "It is the most rewarding, exciting, and humbling thing we do." I also want to be part of the solution instead of becoming one of those people that says, "When I was a kid..." We would love to hear what you are doing to prepare your child for the path. 


and communications from the University of Minnesota, where he was a member of Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity.

leader of her people after his death.

A Cheley alumni and strong woman, Sarah Calhoun (staff 1999) founded Red Ants Pants in 2006 when she was tired of wearing men's work pants that didn't fit. She designed pants that would fit, function and flatter working women. She named her company Red Ants Pants because in an ant colony, the female ants do all the work. Red Ants pants are made in the USA and are

Charles Ehlert (camper 1950s), 79, passed away in Louisville, CO on January 15, 2017. He received his Gold Key in 1953 and was a JC in 1954. He led notable first ascents on Mt. Alice and Mt. Ypsilon while still in his teens, and remained an avid climber and mountaineer throughout his life. His sister, Susan Ehlert Harmann was a camper in the 50s and his children, Elizabeth and Charlie, were campers in the 70s and 80s. His grandchildren are current campers.

John (Jack) Lamkin (camper 1932-1939, staff 1940-1943 and 1946-1947), 94, passed away on May 14, 2017. He lived his whole life in Cape Girardeau, MO and was a founding trustee for the John Austin Cheley Foundation.

Edgar (Ed) Holman (staff 2008-2010) passed away on May 24, 2017 in Colorado Springs, Co. He was on staff at BTE with his wife, Susan, and he was a retired letter carrier after 36 years of service with the USPS.
