Teens from all around the country traveled to the Cheley Colorado Camps for the annual Teen Leadership Summit this August. The program is a partnership with the Air Force Reserves, Air National Guard, and Georgia 4H. The week-long camp serves 14 to 18 year-olds, who have a parent serving in the Reserves or National Guard. The 120 teens selected to attend go through an application process and all programs are co-ed. Through a variety of funding sources, campers' families do not bear any of the cost for attending, including travel.

Cheley/Children's Hospital Burn Camp 2019

"Beauty out of pain." That is the energy that this week radiates. Celebrating its 36th summer, Cheley/Children's Hospital Colorado Burn Camp invited 80 pediatric burn survivors to the heart of the Rocky Mountains for an awe-inspiring week. From the moment they step off the bus to a rousing parade of medical professionals, firefighters, referring hospital staff, current and alumni Cheley counselors, to their final goodbye and appreciation circle, thrilling experiences are shared at camp that will be remembered for a lifetime. With both national and global referring burn units, campers forge friendships with others from near and far. They create a unique community of understanding

and belonging initially due to having been burned, but later due to the memories they create together. In the blink of an eye, a burn injury can forever change a child's life. Yet, given the opportunity to come together and share their stories with one other, campers reflect on their past and continue healing their physical and emotional scars. With their burn injury bringing them together, the safe, challenging, nurturing, and accepting environment at camp is what allows campers to thrive: at Cheley, they climb to new heights, float around the lazy river, sing their heart out, triumph up the Cheley Challenge, and shoot a rifle for the first time. Through this all, they demonstrate

why the camp experience is a necessary and fulfilling part of everyone's story. We are so thankful to have these beautiful children in our lives and hold them in our hearts. We understand the importance of structure and routine at camp.
